#### The Everyday Responsibilities of a Nanny

Caring for infants – changing nappies, preparing bottles, introducing solid foods Giving baths to the kids. Assisting the children in getting dressed Toilet training young children. Assisting the children with their reading, writing, and homework Teaching the children new skills like tying shoelaces, brushing teeth, using utensils. Planning enjoyable and age-appropriate activities like arts and crafts, cooking Accompanying children to activities such as swimming, football, dance classes, music.

Arranging playdates. Taking care of the children when they are unwell, including administering appropriate medication.

Engaging in indoor and outdoor games.

Escorting the children to the park, museum, library.



### **Nanny Nursery Duties**

Nannies have a range of responsibilities beyond just taking care of children. These additional tasks, often referred to as "nursery duties," are an integral part of their job. Nannies are expected to ensure that the home remains in the same condition as when they arrived. Some of these duties may include:

- 1. Making and changing the children's beds, as well as keeping their rooms clean and organized.
  - 2. Cleaning and sterilizing baby bottles.
  - 3. Maintaining a clean, tidy, and organized playroom.
    - 4. Taking care of the children's laundry and ironing.
- 5. Preparing and cooking nutritious meals and snacks for the children, and cleaning up afterward.
  - 6. Cleaning up after arts, crafts, and cooking activities.
  - 7. Ensuring the bathroom is clean and tidy after use by the children.
  - 8. Packing packed lunches or snacks for activities, trips, or outings.
    - 9. Assisting with packing for the children when they go on trips.
  - 10. Putting away the children's books, clothes, and toys after use.
- 11. Vacuuming the areas where the children have been playing or eating at the end of the day.

**Extra Housekeeping Duties** 

In addition to their childcare responsibilities, nannies may be willing to take on extra housekeeping duties, as long as they have the time and are fairly compensated.

- 2. Handling all the laundry and ironing tasks (some nannies are okay with washing the parents' clothes along with the children's, but ironing them alone can be quite a demanding task)
  - 3. Cleaning the bathrooms that are not used by the children
- 4. Preparing and cooking meals and snacks for the entire family or any guests, excluding the children, on a regular basis
- 5. Running various errands such as dry cleaning, grocery shopping, and going to the post office
  - 6. Organizing, vacuuming, or dusting rooms other than the children's bedrooms and playrooms
    - 7. Purchasing supplies or clothes for the family
    - 8. Taking care of the house or pets while the family is away
      - 9. Providing care for a sick family member
    - 10. Communicating with tradespeople, answering phone calls, and handling postal tasks.



## **Extra Housekeeping Duties**

In a nutshell, nannies often go the extra mile out of sheer practicality.

For instance, they might take the initiative to include the parent's laundry along with the children's. However, it's important to remember that it's a give-and-take relationship.

Mutual respect and understanding are key in building a strong bond between the nanny and employer. If these acts of kindness and practicality become expected or taken for granted by the employer, it can lead to resentment and relationship problems.
