What is a Governess





A governess has distinct responsibilities compared to a nanny. They are hired to work with school-aged children and oversee their education.

Governesses typically do not work with infants or toddlers. Instead, families choose to employ a governess once their child or children are ready to begin school.

When you hire a governess, you're essentially bringing in a private tutor who goes beyond academics. A governess not only helps your child with their formal and informal education but also plays a crucial role in shaping their social skills, including etiquette, resilience, and confidence.

Unlike a private tutor who typically offers supplementary education on an hourly basis, a governess provides full-time support in both educational and social aspects.

Additionally, a governess can collaborate with a private teacher or tutor to ensure your child receives comprehensive educational assistance.

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The job duties of a governess differ from those of a nanny, and include:

1. Establishing a daily routine that includes tailored educational activities.

2. Creating a lesson plan for home-schooling.

3. Teaching a wide range of subjects such as math, science, art, music, and foreign languages.

4. Instructing children on proper etiquette, manners, and behaviour.

5. Providing appropriate breaks for meals, playtime, and other nonlearning activities.

6. Building a working relationship with the children's nanny.

7. Providing updates and feedback to the parents to ensure their needs are being met.

8. Assisting in preparing children for school tests and exams.

9. Establishing routines for children attending school outside the home to complete homework or learn additional subjects.

10. Providing transportation to and from educational and schoolrelated activities.

As you can observe, governesses primarily focus on educational child development and learning, rather than providing caregiving services.
